living has been so long and so deeply interested in the physical, educational, moral and spiritual well-being of all our people from the youngest infant to the oldest grand-sire as I have been and still am. To condense into a five minutes talk what I consider due to this occassion, is the philosophers problem of compressing the whole world into one cubic inch.

When I look back half a certury I see in all Chippewa County, then embracing all of Luce, only one solitary school building, aside from the two Indian Schools, one on Sugar Island the other at Wha-is- ke Bay, that one, the old school in this hamlet now city. That building only lately pulled down, served this community seventy-five years as a general purpose house. Primarily a school house, various churches used it, The Presbyterian, the Methodist Episcopal and the Baptist Churches were organized in it and the fadies Club used it last leaving it only to go to their present habitat

George Wendling son of a blacksmith studied law, then took the platform - His lectures "Paul versus Demosthenes", "The mistakes of Ingersoll" and "The man of Galilee" delivered in his firey eloquence, have held spell-bound mighty audiences, during the last generation.
